# VOCAL & CHORAL ADJUDICATOR: Henriette Schellenberg

Canadian soprano Henriette Schellenberg has enjoyed an international career performing and recording worldwide with conductors such as Charles Dutoit, Robert Shaw, Helmut Rilling, Seiji Ozawa and Zubin Mehta, to name but a few. Her discography includes works with the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, Bach Choir of Bethlehem, CBC Vancouver Orchestra, and several CBC recordings: "The Gift of Messiah", Britten's "Les Illuminations" with the Manitoba Chamber Orchestra (which received a Juno nomination) and a Clara Schumann CD with pianist Irmgard Baerg. Since retiring from the stage, she has been invited to teach masterclasses

and participate as juror on international music competitions and festivals across Canada. Currently she is also assistant professor of music at Canadian Mennonite University. Ms. Schellenberg has taught and/or coached singers for about 30 years, and especially enjoys helping students with their lyric diction; her specialty is German Lieder and concert/oratorio repertoire. She lives in a small rural Manitoba town with her husband, conductor Rudy Schellenberg, and one cat.



# PIANO—JUNIOR/INTERMEDIATE ADJUDICATOR: Cherith Alexander

Cherith Alexander is a well-known Saskatchewan pianist. After completing her A.R.C.T. at the age of 15, Cherith began studying with William Moore of the University of Regina. She went on to win numerous provincial competitions including the SMFA Concerto Competition after which she performed as a guest soloist with the Regina Symphony Orchestra. In 1991 she represented Saskatchewan at the National Music Festival. She has studied in Toronto, at the Banff School of the Arts with Jane Coop, and the University of British Columbia where she was a pupil of Lee Kum Sing and a winner of the UBC Concerto Competition. An experienced accompanist and chamber musician, Cherith has performed with many renowned musicians including The Adaskin String Trio, Henri Loiselle, Roland Szentpali, Ondrej Vrabec and Steven Patterson. Another musical

highlight for Cherith has been travelling seven times to the National Music Festival as an accompanist for the Saskatchewan competitors. Cherith lives on a farm near Weyburn, Saskatchewan with her husband and four children. She is in demand as a piano and theory teacher, adjudicator, clinician and performer. Her piano students have received acclaim at both the provincial and national level. In 2011 her pupil Meagan Milatz was the grand prize winner in the Canadian Federation of Music Teachers' Association piano competition. She has also become a frequent piano adjudicator at major festivals throughout Western Canada including Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Regina, Port Coquitlam, and the Calgary and Edmonton Kiwanis Festivals.



# PIANO—ADVANCED/SENIOR/NATIONAL ADJUDICATOR: Thomas Davidson

**Thomas Davidson** is a graduate of Queen's University, The Royal College of Music in London, England and McGill University where he earned the Master of Music degree. Hailed for his "impressive command of the instrument", he is a frequent performer as soloist, accompanist and chamber musician both in Canada and abroad, and also on CBC radio. Davidson is the Founder and Artistic Director of Trio Chanteclair (soprano, clarinet and piano) and has been responsible for the commissioning and première performances of many contemporary Canadian works—including both solo piano and chamber music repertoire. He has produced a compact disc recording entitled *Canadian Première Performances* featuring some of this repertoire. This CD is distributed by the Canadian Music Centre. Assistant Professor at Queen's and

McGill Universities, where he has been teaching piano and musicianship since 1984, Davidson divides his time during the academic session between Montréal and Kingston. At present, he is Associate Piano Coordinator at Queen's School of Music and Chair of Musicianship Studies at McGill's Schulich School of Music. Other activities include teaching a number of piano students at the McGill Conservatory of Music and Marianopolis College (CEGEP) in Montréal. He has also been a executive committee member of the Quebec Music Teachers Association, is currently

the Past President of the Canadian Music Festival Adjudicators' Association and also the Québec Provincial Administrator for the National Music Festival (Federation of Canadian Music Festivals). Davidson is in demand as a workshop animator, examiner and adjudicator across Canada and in the United States.



#### **STRINGS** ADJUDICATOR: Minna Rose Chung

Korean-American cellist Minna Rose Chung tours internationally as a recitalist and chamber musician and is critically regarded for her intelligent and admirable performances. In 2008 Dr. Chung joined the University of Manitoba Marcel A. Desautels Faculty of Music as Professor of Cello. She holds performance degrees from Oberlin Conservatory. Northwestern University and a Doctorate of Musical Arts from Stony Brook University, NY with the renowned cellist Colin Carr. Minna Rose made her Carnegie Hall debut in 2007 with her new music ensemble, the

Pangea String Quartet. Dr. Chung is a featured guest artist with the Santo Domingo Music Festival and the Rio de Janeiro International Cello Encounter and has recorded orchestral works with The New World Symphony (Miami FL) and the Fairbanks Symphony Orchestra (Alaska). Her live performances are broadcasted on NPR, CBC Canada, and WFMT-Chicago. Aside from teaching, Minna Rose is the Director of Project Rio, a collaborative arena for master classes and performance series between Manitoba and the Rio International Cello Encounter in Brazil. She is also a founding member of the Azure String Quartet, a highly commanding ensemble dedicated to the vast milieu of chamber works.





# CLASSICAL GUITAR ADJUDICATOR: James Hickerson

James Hickerson { B.Mus.Perf, B.Ed } is a teacher of music and English Language Arts for the Louis Riel School Division in Winnipeg. He was first smitten by and bitten by the teaching bug when he sat down for the very first time to try to coach some guitar playing out of some 6 and 7 year olds back in September of 1977. It worked, they played, and thus began a lifelong calling and an obsession: how to explain it better then make it possible. Since that first day he has taught well over a thousand people to play and play better. He has taught in schools, in his own studio, as a university sessional instructor, as a Manitoba Arts Council artist-in-residence for songwriting

and choral music, and at the International Music Camp in the Peace Gardens. James is a veteran performer in the Winnipeg acoustic music community. He is active as a singer-songwriter and as a multi-instrumentalist sideman, performing on guitars, banjo, mandolin, slide, and bass. He has performed across the country, the Midwestern US, on television and radio, and has contributed tracks to many diverse recordings. His own recordings have been featured on CBC radio regionally and nationally.

# WOODWINDS & BRASS ADJUDICATOR: Allen Harrington

Allen Harrington is an Assistant Professor at the University of Manitoba Marcel A. Desautels Faculty of Music where he teaches saxophone, bassoon, and chamber music. As "an extremely fluid player of superb artistry" (Thunder Bay Chronicle Journal), Allen has amazed and delighted audiences with his "honest sound, ...radio-active resonance," (Halifax Chronicle Herald) "considerable virtuosity," and "mellifluous tone," (Winnipeg Free Press). A native of Saskatoon, he holds degrees from the University of Saskatchewan (B.Mus.) and Northwestern University (M.Mus.) He maintains a busy schedule outside his University teaching career as a so-

loist, orchestral and chamber musician, and adjudicator. Allen has appeared as a soloist with more than a dozen orchestras in Canada, Europe, and South America. In the last few years he has given recital tours for Debut Atlantic and Prairie Debut, in addition to touring in Asia and Brazil. Highlights of this past season included performances in the United States and Europe, a concerto appearance with the Regina Symphony Orchestra, and a performance with Groundswell which was recorded for national broadcast on CBC radio. As a bassoonist, Allen has been a member of the National Youth Orchestra of Canada. He currently plays second bassoon with the Manitoba Chamber Orchestra and is a regular extra with the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra.



On Saturday, Nancy again led the training session, with Joanne Mercier and Cathy Wach-Dueck giving those in attendance an overview of the Index of Arts Specialists, the Adjudicator Handbook and Adjudicator Recommendation to the Provincial Finals forms.

# Looking Backward, Looking Forward

Looking Backward

Like many other kids about my age, my first Festival experience was singing in a choir at the Winnipeg Auditorium (now converted to the Provincial Archives Building). It was in 1938, and I was in grade I at Greenway School. What an exciting day it was, to travel downtown on a bus, and then get up on the stage of that huge building, and sing to a large audience of other choirs and parents! The adjudicator was Sir Hugh Roberton, the famed conductor of the Glasgow Orpheus Choir. He thought our singing was marvelous and awarded us marks of 92 and 94. I have never forgotten that day, and I suppose it was then that I became hooked on the Festival.

I sang in many other choirs at the Festival, perhaps the most memorable of which were the Winnipeg Boys' Choir directed by Beth Douglas, and, when I was in grade XII at Daniel McIntyre Collegiate, a choir of 100 boys directed by Glen Pierce. I also played in piano and organ classes, and later directed church, school and community choirs and orchestras in all sorts of Festival classes. It was nice to win a class occasionally, but what I enjoyed most was hearing the other singers and players and everyone's adjudications – a very inexpensive way to get an education in performing music!

My father had been a member of the Winnipeg Male Voice Choir and a Festival volunteer for many years, so when I was asked to become the Assistant Treasurer of the Men's Music Club which was then operating the Festival, I agreed. James Seaton was the Treasurer, and he instructed me carefully how to use our one ancient adding machine, do the banking and bookkeeping (all written in big ledgers), pay all the bills, and organize the Festival Box Offices. Jimmy was a lot of fun, and we had a great time looking after all the financial matters together. He then retired, and I became the Treasurer. That led to working on just about every Winnipeg Festival Committee and doing almost every Festival job over the next 50 plus years, enjoying almost every minute. I was also happy to help the Associated Manitoba Arts Festivals.

Although our Festival has undergone many, many changes over the years, it has certainly been a positive experience in my life, and I believe most volunteers feel the same way. In 2001, the "International Year of the Volunteer", the Winnipeg Music Festival honoured my wife Coralie and me by establishing the "Coralie & John Standing Volunteer Award", which is presented to the outstanding volunteers at each year's Festival. We hope this will continue for many years to come.

#### Looking Forward

Well, what of the future?

How will we insure that the Festival will still be operating in the year 2018, its 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary, and for many years after that ?

Will we consider expanding our Syllabus to include classes for local composers, and for jazz and good modern music?

Will we continue to find the very best adjudicators available, and perhaps expand their role to include master classes?


Will we have to raise entry fees to unreasonable levels just to pay our bills, or will we find a way to obtain secure funding for all our activities?

Would we think of trying to establish a building of our own, perhaps on the campus of one of our Universities or at The Forks, where all the Festival classes could be held, perhaps at different times of the year? Such a building would need to have a properly designed large hall for choral classes, and smaller halls for vocal, piano, string, guitar and woodwind classes. It should have lots of parking, especially for buses, and of course be available to other performing groups when the Festival is not in session.

I challenge the Festival, so wonderfully managed over 94 years by the likes of George S. Mathieson, Reg Hugo, Richard Cooke, James Seaton, Murray Campbell, Bill Muir, and Joanne Mercier, to keep its high standards and its motto, adopted by music festivals around the world and first stated by Sir H. Walford Davies, Master of the King's Musick:

In Musical Festivals, the object is not to gain a prize or defeat a rival, but to pace one another on the road to excellence.

Peacefully, after a brief illness on Tuesday, August 21, 2012 at Kingston General Hospital, Don Raleigh, aged 86. He leaves behind his son Jack (Joan) and grandchildren James, William and Julia of Kingston; son-in-law Mark Wonneck and grandsons Luke and Aidan of Calgary. He is also survived by his brother Jack (Dianne) of Portland, Oregon, and three children Jeannine, Jeannette and Jim and their families; brother-in-law Jim (Sandra) Pitblado of Toronto and their four children Wendy, Diane, Jamie and John and their families. He was predeceased by his parents Fred and Lucille Raleigh, wife Janice Raleigh, daughter Sue Wonneck and nephew David Pitblado.

Although born in Kenora, Ontario he spent the majority of his life in Winnipeg and at his beloved cottage in Sandy Hook, Manitoba. For health reasons he moved to Kingston in 2010, most recently to Arbour Heights Long Term Care, where he was treated royally.

Don, or Bones' as he was known to his friends and the sporting fraternity, was a well known sports personality. He participated in sports all his life, having played hockey, baseball, golf, badminton, tennis and curling. He excelled in hockey, with a 10 year career with the New York Rangers from 1947-1956 including being team captain for two seasons. He also had a short stint with the Rangers in 1943 as a 17 year old. He played in two NHL All-Star games and established several Ranger records including two consecutive overtime winning goals in the 1950 Stanley Cup Finals. Upon leaving hockey, Don entered the insurance field, eventually owning his own agency.

Bones served on a number of Boards including the Manitoba Hockey Foundation, the Misericordia Hospital Foundation, the Lions Club of Winnipeg, the Lions Housing Foundation, the Winnipeg Winter Club and Rainbow Stage. He established bursaries at the University of Brandon, which he attended while playing junior hockey.

He also established the Raleigh Family Mozart Scholarships at the Associated Manitoba Arts Festivals to express his love of Mozart's music.

He was a long time chairman of the Lindsay Street Garden Club and also the chairman of the #6 (Jim Whitecross) Air Cadet squadron Sponsoring Committee, on behalf of the Lions Club of Winnipeg. Don was a proud and honoured member of the Manitoba Sports Hall of Fame, the Manitoba Hockey Hall of Fame, and the University of Brandon Hockey Hall of Fame. He was a co-wearer of New York Ranger sweater #7 which has been retired at Madison Square Garden. He enjoyed many hobbies including stamp collecting, war history, gardening, astronomy, poetry and classical music. His charm and sense of humour endeared him to all who knew him.

One of his favourite poems was Thanotopsis by William Cullen Bryant, which discusses life and death and closes with these sublime sentiments:

So live, that when thy summons comes to join
The innumerable caravan which moves
To that mysterious realm where each shall take
His chamber in the silent halls of death,
Thou go not, like the quarry-slave at night,
Scourged to his dungeon, but, sustained and soothed
By an unfaltering trust, approach thy grave,
Like one who wraps the drapery of his couch
About him, and lies down to pleasant dreams.
